Decision Time Coming Up

The litigation between the City of Watsonville and the Watsonville Pilots Association (WPA) and others is scheduled to be heard on July 27th at 0900 at the County Court House, Department 8.

The current situation is that the briefs have essentially been completed and are being submitted to the court. Although I have looked at the WPA's brief, the City's brief, and the Caltrans brief my experience is flying airplanes. But my impression is that excellent work has been done in preparation by attorneys for WPA, Friends of Buena Vista (FOBV), and the State. It would be naive to speculate as to what a court will find.

There is a lot at stake. Houses built off the ends of the runway in safety zones in Buena Vista will create new noise and safety problems. The future of Runway 8-26 would be tenuous at best and would no doubt be restricted and then closed. It's clear from reading the City's response to the Santa Cruz County Grand Jury Report that their idea is to close 8-26.

Encroachment will severely compromise the functionality and viability of Watsonville Airport. History has shown that encroachment has killed off many airports, including locally Santa Cruz Skypark and Carmel Valley Airport. For this reason people in California and throughout the Country are watching litigation.

Win, lose, or draw I think we need to think about what could happen next and what to do about it? Yes, there are things that will need to be done if we win or we lose. A draw, an in-between kind of decision, such as "further study", would be a poor result of the litigation. The City Manager says this "further study" is the result of most of their previous court cases and they eventually get what they want. This simply would prolong the litigation. It looks to me (layman's view) like there is enough specific content in the WPA and State briefs that this may not happen. A knowledgeable friend agrees. Let's hope and pray our contributions and efforts are successful.

If at all possible I plan to attend the Court hearing on July 27th to see what transpires and what is likely to happen in the future.

Watsonville Fly-In & Air Show shatters past year's records

After putting together what they say was the best Fly-In and Air Show in the past nine years, organizers have raised the bar for years to come. Over the Memorial Day weekend an estimated 33,000 aviation enthusiasts made their way to the airport to see the nearly 300 planes that were on display at the 43rd annual event. The attendance mark shattered last year's 25,000.

"Overall it was highly successful," Dave Brockmann, marketing director of the air show, said Tuesday. Brockmann said the low marine layer likely turned away some pilots who choose not to land with limited visibility, but there were still plenty of planes. The antique and home-built aircraft that made it in drew crowds. This year, however, belonged to the military.

"The highlight was the F-18s and the Harriers," Brockmann said. As the Harriers, commonly called "jump jets" for their ability to take off and land vertically, and the pair of F-18 Navy fighter jets took to the sky, they were received with a standing ovation on the ground. The crowd chanted "U.S.A"

Brockmann said it will be several weeks before there's a clear picture of how the show did financially but early numbers are promising, including \$30,000 of advance tickets sold online. Brockmann said the amount is \$13,000 more than the combined ticket sales for last year's event.

"We found a combination of things that worked well," he said. The addition of a classic car show this year and the return of several aerobatics performers are all possibilities for the planning of next year's event that gets under way in two months, Brockmann said. We'll sit down and sort out all the elements," he said.

Weather Web Page

As a pilot I found myself always looking for timely and accurate weather information, but tailored to where I live or where I was going. NOAA and the National Weather service have a lot of great information along with the FAA and DUATS. Some time ago, I created a web page to collect all the good stuff that I would need as a pilot living on the Monterey Bay. It includes many web cams for this area, including the three at WVI, (so I could see what the fog was really doing), along with visible, infrared, and full motion satellite shots. There are real time RADAR shots for this area, along with full motion loops. There are also standard and full motion graphical forecasts (for wind and weather) along with one tailored for pilots by the NWS. Minutes

Treasures Report

- Sarah reported that the WPA funds are sufficient for operations.
- Several months ago, there was a \$1,000 reward offered to help stop the rash of hangar break-ins. A suspect was apprehended and the reward was paid. The WPA paid \$150 towards that reward.
- The WPA donated \$120.00 to the family of Ed Nervino for a bench honoring his memory. It is placed by the terminal building facing the airport. Ed had been an active member of our association since 1988.

New Business

- On July 27th there will be a court hearing concerning the urban development project proposed in the Buena Vista area by the City of Watsonville and its developers. The safety of the general and the flying public are an issue here along with the future of the Watsonville Airport. The hearing will be at the Santa Cruz County Courthouse, Department 8, at 9 AM. Dan Chauvet and others said that they would attend. Several in the group remarked that we are very fortunate to have such an excellent and thorough attorney to help our airport in times such as these. There were also several in attendance that had reviewed the three briefs and all were rather shocked to see the cities use of language in their brief. Some words really carried a strong and misleading negative connotation. Many words were just plain derogatory.
- John Cowan asked if WPA members were up to putting together a phone tree to help solicit email addresses from some of its members. John said that "The fact we don't have these email addresses might just be an oversight and not necessarily an objection to it. I guess we should at least ask." He said that email was such an efficient way to bring vital and timely information to its members that it was worth a try. The response was positive and there were several volunteers for the task.

- Rayvon Williams announced that The FAA Wings program would be undergoing some really big changes starting next year that would amount to a complete revamp of the system. In order to help with the transition and understanding of it, he will try to bring Jack Hocker of the FAA to a couple of our future meetings. Spatial Disorientation

Rayvon Williams presented our WINGS Safety Seminar this month on Spatial Disorientation. He remarked that even he had experienced spatial disorientation on a couple of occasions. It was his IFR training that helped keep him safe. The presentation consisted mainly of viewing a DVD titled "Spatial Disorientation, The Confusion that Kills". This is an excellent video and presentation. It is a fact that 90% of all spatial disorientation accidents are fatal.

Three main rules that can help avoid this danger are:

Maintain VFR.

- Continued VFR into IMC is a major cause of fatal accidents caused by spatial disorientation.
- Expectation of success, thinking, hoping that things will clear up and get better is a fatal mindset.

Fly within your capabilities.

All pilots should have a well thought out set of personal minimums. You should stick to them, and only make changes to them as your ability changes. Flying into IMC is not the time to ignore this point.

Get an Instrument rating.

Some other very smart practices are:

- Be familiar with the aircraft that you are flying.
- Be familiar with and use the Autopilot.
- Get a redundant power source. Don't just rely on one vacuum source, especially for an Attitude Indicator. Maybe a redundant electrical Attitude Indicator is the answer. Just don't put all your eggs in one basket.
- Get timely and accurate weather reports.
- Encourage PIREPS.
